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Dear Friend,

We realise your perplexity.

You may wonder why build a monastery in such solitudes?

What is the meaning of the life of the nuns who live in it?...

To fully answer these questions would require a lot of time. Here, we offer you brief excerpts from the Statutes of the Carthusian Nuns and some illustrations about our vocation that will help you understand the mystery of our LIFE and grasp our MESSAGE.

It all started nine centuries ago:

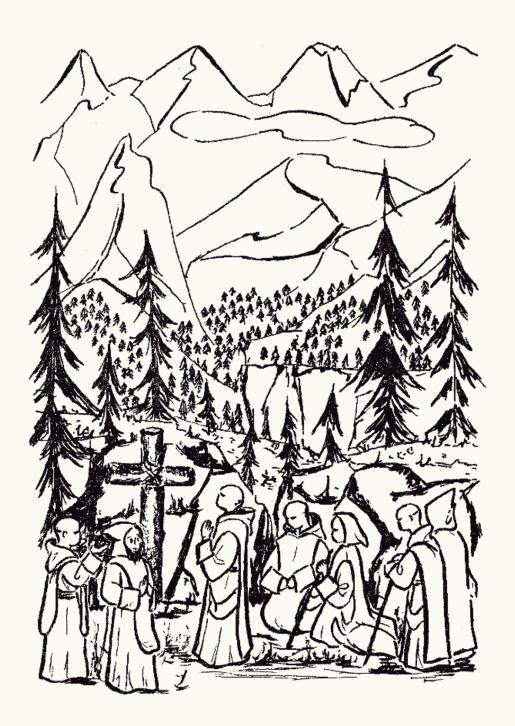
Bruno with six companions,

"aflame with divine love",

left everything and withdrew into the forests of

CHARTREUSE, in France.

There, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, and learning from experience, they developed their own particular style of hermit life, SOLITUDE AND FRATERNITY which was handed down to succeeding generations, not by the written word, but by example.



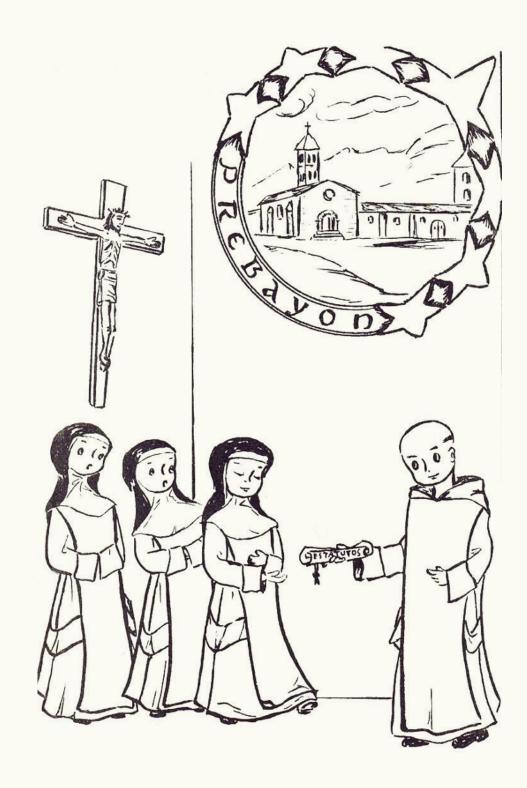
Other hermitages were founded in imitation of that of Chartreuse.
(Statutes 1. 1)

The small group of solitaries had a discreet, but attractive influence.

The nuns of Prébayon, in Provence, wished to follow the same path, and decided spontaneously to embrace the Carthusian way of life.

The Order received them in its bosom, and they became the first DAUGHTERS OF SAINT BRUNO.

It was around 1145.



Our Fathers followed a light which came from the East.

The nuns undertake to walk the same path.

(Statutes 3. 2)

Soon the sons of Saint Bruno multiplied, and with them the Carthusian nuns.

Several dozens of women houses were founded in Europe.

Some were great places of spiritual life.

From its origins to the present day, the female branch of the Carthusian Order has accompanied the monks, with only a brief interruption after the French Revolution.



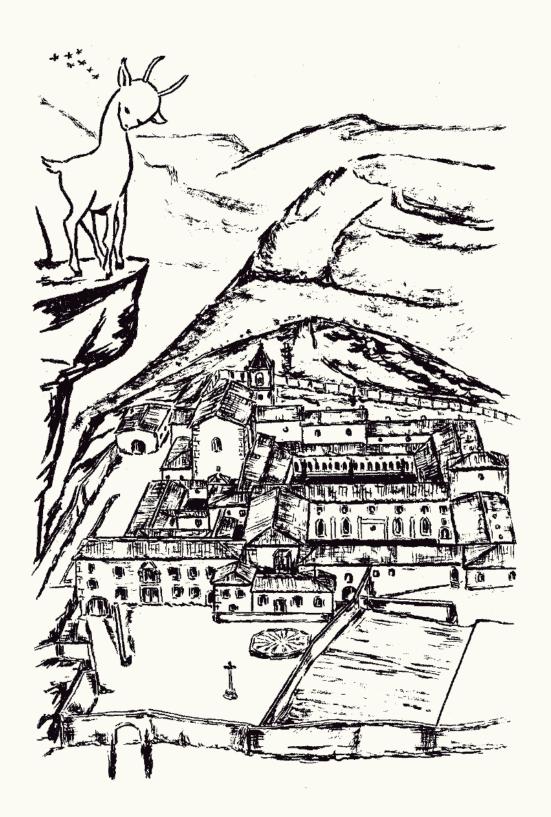
In accordance with the tradition of our Fathers, new foundations should be made in isolated places.

We are the heiresses of Saint Bruno's IDEAL.

Like him
we desire to seek God ardently
to find him more quickly.

The location of our monasteries is a visible expression of our longing.

in which everything points to GOD



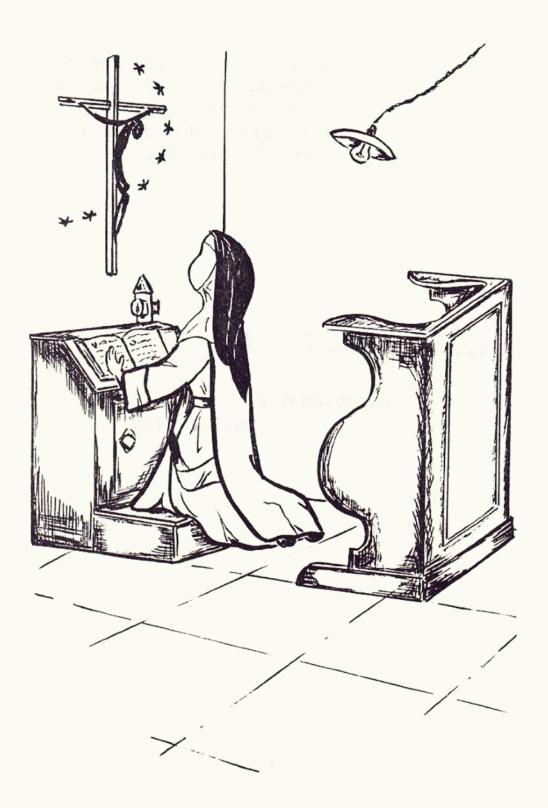
Our principal endeavour and our vocation are to find God in silence and solitude. (Statutes 4. 1)

Our charism is the SOLITARY LIFE.

Cells and workplaces are arranged like hermitages.

The greater part of our life is spent in solitude.

In the CELL, we devote ourselves to recollection, prayer and intercession.



It is a mistake to believe that one can easily attain to intimate union with God, whilst having neglected study of the word of God. (Statutes 20. 2)

...fitting to our life.

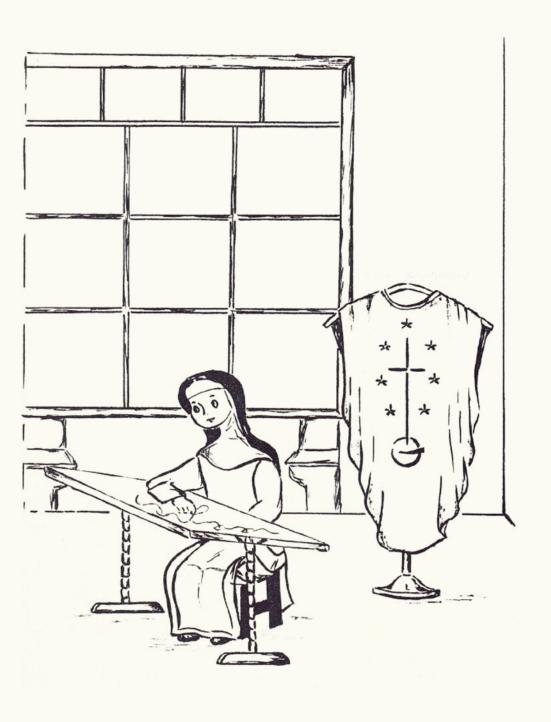


By ensuring a happy equilibrium, work helps to profit more from solitude.

(Statutes 20. 9)

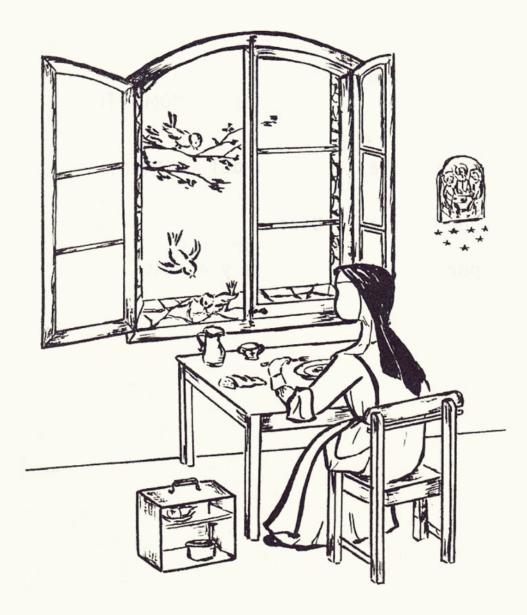

Accustoming oneself to tranquil listening with the heart, which allows God to penetrate it by all ways and all means of access.



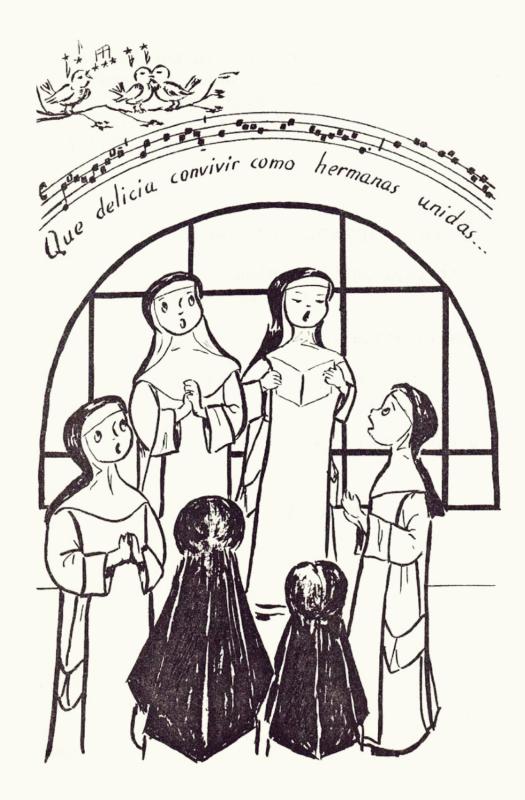
We are resolute to joyfully advance together on the path that leads to God. (Statutes 26. 1)

Bruno did not enter alone into the desert, but with brethren.

We, his daughters, are not isolated hermits.

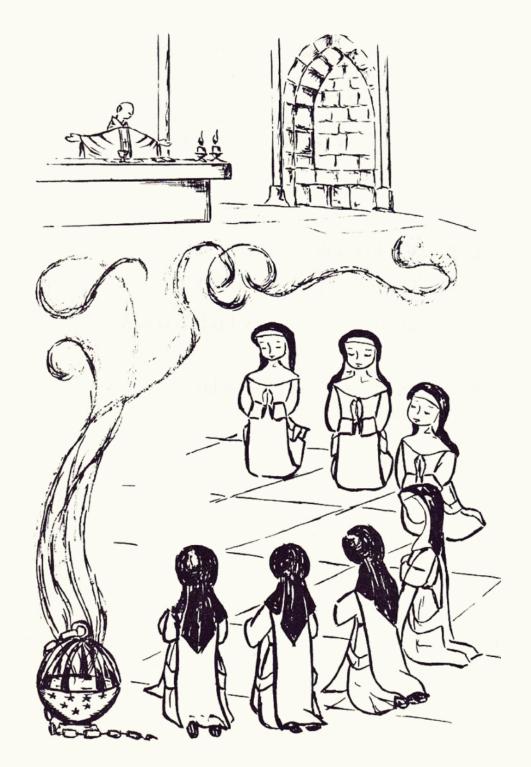
Our monasteries are also places of intense FRATERNAL LIFE.

The sisters are united with one another by a same ideal and sustained by shared affection.



The Eucharistic Sacrifice is the centre and the summit of our life, and the manna of our spiritual exodus. (Statutes 4. 2)

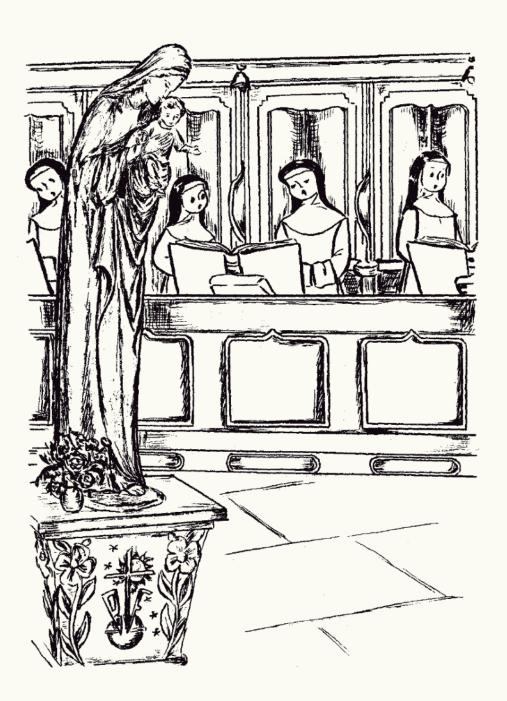
The sacred LITURGY, in which we take part each day, gives us life through CHRIST'S BLOOD and brings us together in one CHURCH.



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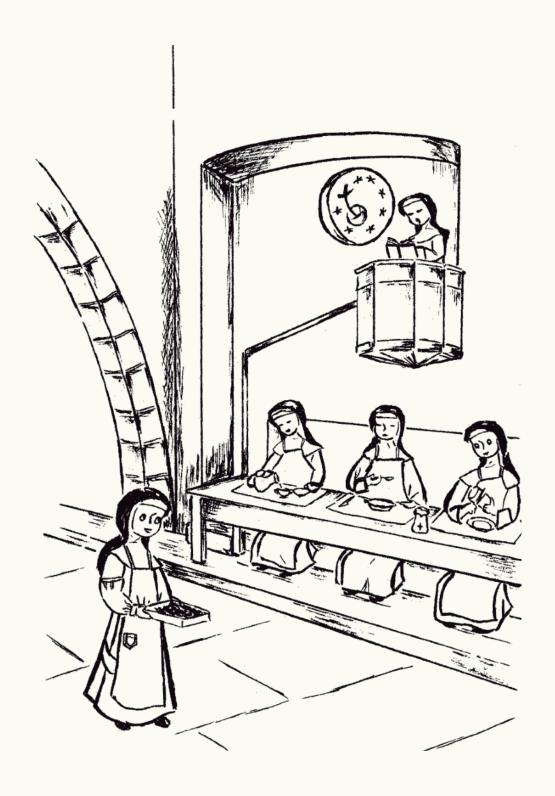
In the divine Office, the sacrament of the Word and the exultation of the chant implore on our behalf the silent God. (cf. Statutes 14. 8-10)

The night VIGIL, that we celebrate at midnight, and the evening praise of VESPERS are privileged occasions of fraternal gathering.

that family life brings.
(Statutes 15. 6)

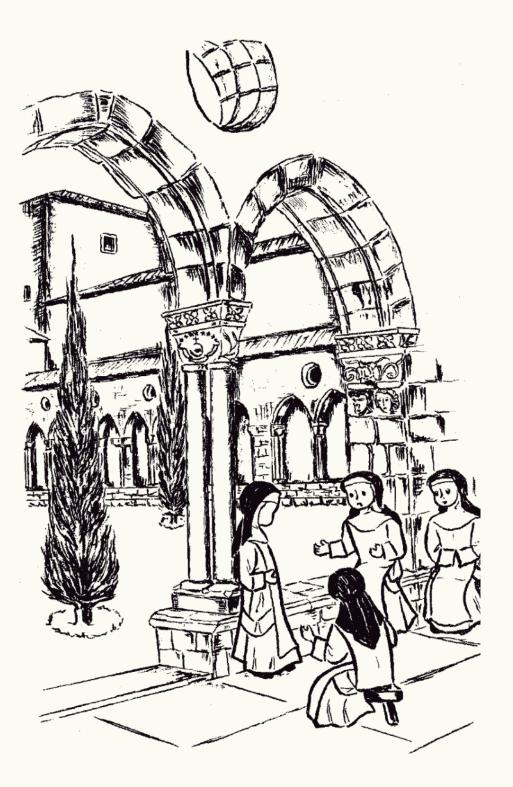
On Sundays and Feast days
we take dinner together
in the refectory,
while listening to

We who live in God's house should first and foremost bear witness to the love that comes from Him.

(Statutes 29. 4)

28 ...on Sundays and Solemnities, we have a chapter meeting and a recreation.



The mind can often be refreshed and renewed by the desert's charm or the beauty of the countryside. (Statutes 15. 9)

...and a long weekly walk, contributes to mutual knowledge and union of hearts.

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Christ saved the human race by his prayer, above all, and by his immolation. In striving to share in this deepest aspect of Redemption we exercise an apostolate of an eminent degree. (Statutes 30. 4)

What benefit and what divine joy the solitude and silence of the Desert bring to those who love them, only those know who have experienced them. (Statutes 30. 1)

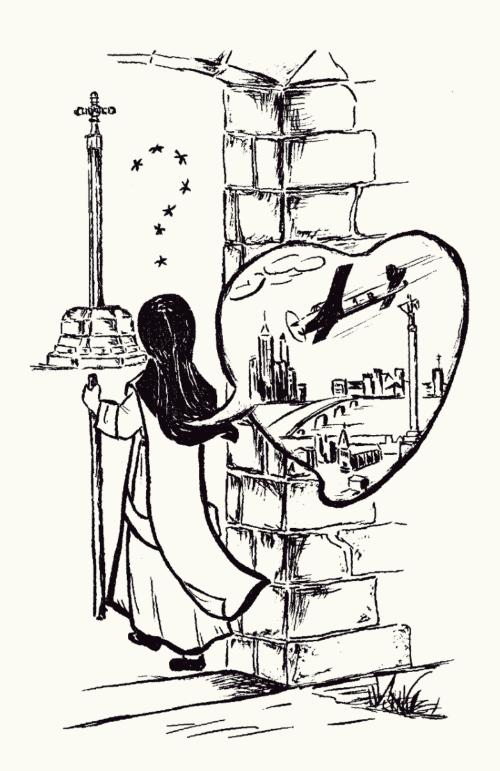
But,

our brothers.

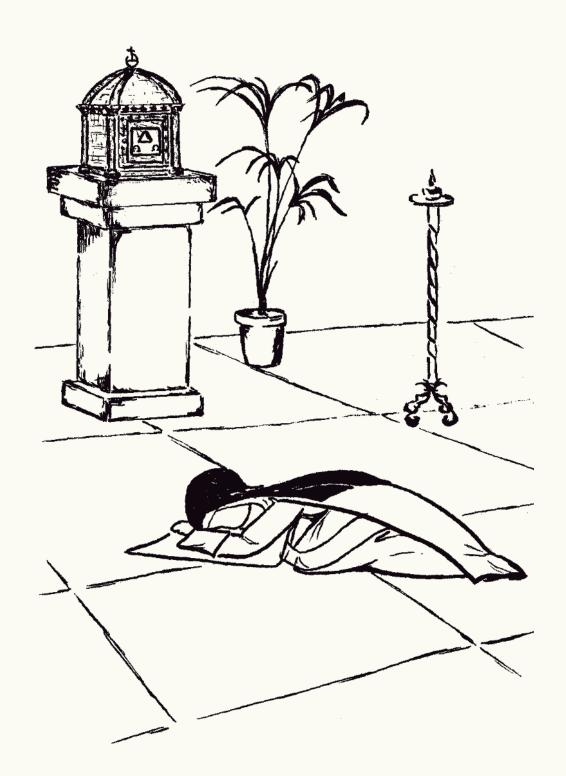


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We bear witness, before the world, that apart from Him there is no God. (Statutes 30.3)

(St Bruno's letter to his friend Radulphus)

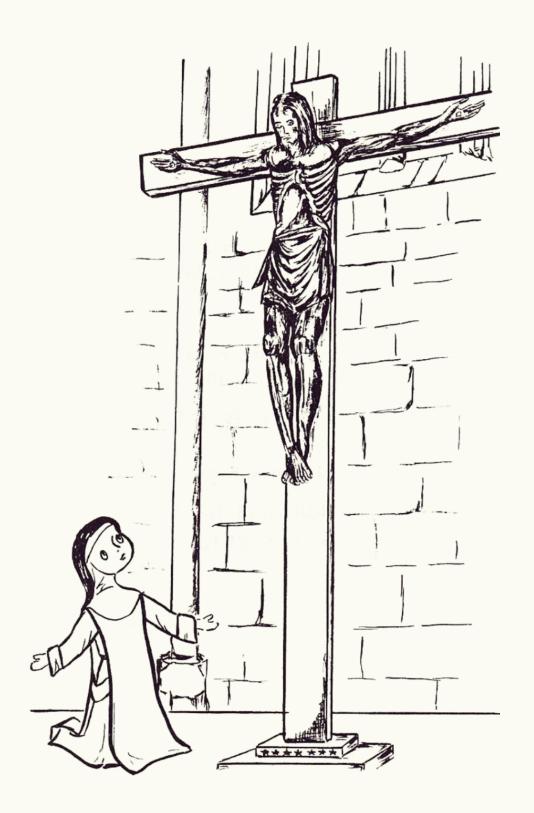


It is in the name of all that

Monastic life, today as always, means choosing God.

However, we do not desert the human family, but assume a MISSION of intercession on behalf of and in favor of all.

We are in solidarity with the entire human race..



May each one, forgetful of herself and of what she has left behind, press on towards the goal. (Statutes 29. 3)

If in spite of all this...
our choice seems foolish to you,
and you remain unable to understand and approve...

Then, Listen:

Is not your own heart burning with an ideal of generosity, and total surrender to LOVE?

To that ideal of yours
we feel very close:
for it is what has drawn us
to the desert.



We have not chosen this excellent part in order to be the only ones to benefit from it.

It is a duty we are to fulfill in the Church.

(Statutes 30. 1)

And so, leaving you, we tell you with all our heart:

Keep going!
We are always by your side.
